Abstract:

Original, typescript, and photocopies of letters written by Norwegian immigrants to relatives, friends, and newspapers in Norway, including letters and articles treating emigration to Australia, Canada, New Zealand, and Queensland. for a selection of letters independently described, see nos. 239, 289, 332, 361, 365, 429, 430, 474, 653, 669, 725, 743, 768, 814, 835, 1211, 1380, 1432, 1463, 1468. A large portion of the letters were collected by Theodore C. Blegen. Some 300 letters have been collected by Norsk Historisk Kjeldeskrift Institutt in Oslo, Norway. The collection contains an index and is arranged chronologically.

Photostatic copies of letters by Gustav Fredrik Dietrichson, 1851

A Lutheran clergyman in Luther Valley, Wisconsin. The first one is a letter of gratitude for a comfortable and safe passage to America and appeared in Stavanger Amstidende og Adresseavis. The second letter announces a new parish at Wiota, Wisconsin, and includes a historical sketch of the congreation. Published in Christiania-posten. Se "America Letters and Articles" in card catalogue. Wisconsin, Black Earth, Fond de Lac, and Madison. Letters (1851-1866). Photostatic copies of letters by anonymous writers that appeared in Adressebladet, Christiania-posten, and Morgenbladet. The Madison letters contain descriptions of the journey and of Madison, procedures to use in dealing with immigration agents, and life in Pleasant Springs Township with reference to land and tax systems and Americanization. Other topics disucssed are Yankee respect for all honorable work, the Westward movement, politics, the common school controversy, and the slavery questions. Reference is made to Claus L. Clausen, Marcus Thrane, Emigranten, Faedrenelandet, and Skandinaven. The Black Earth letter gives an account of a pleasant journey on a steamship and makes reference to Pastor John N. Fjeld. The Fond du Lac letters deal with cultural life as well as living conditions in rural areas.

Postmaster in Løiten, Hedemark, reprinted in
Arbeiderforeningernes blad July 3, 1852, from Hamars budstikke.

The letter is a reply to a series of letters entitled "Billeder fra Nordamerika i 1849 of A. Tolmer," addressed to the editor of the French Journal des Debats, and published in Budstikken during 1850-1851. Gjestvang criticizes the dark picture the French captain painted of Texas after histrip through parts of the United States. He admires the love of country which Norwegians display but believes that emigration, not a rare feature of human society, can be defended in Norway on the basis of poverty and unemployment. See Norwegian-American Studies and Records, 20:32-45 and Blegen Land of Their Choice, 355-368. Photostatic copy of letter written (New York - 1852) on July 22 containing an account of writer's interview with Mr. Schlytter, Norwegian engineer, regarding claoric machinery being installed in a ship. A translation of an item concerning that machine which appeared in The Evening Mirror is also included. Published in Morgenbladet August 27.

To a relative commending American wages, climate, crops, machinery and tools, food, and work opportunities. Written from Janesville, Rock County, Wisconsin. Published in Arbeider Foreningers blad November 6, 1853. Photostatic copy of letter from Koffstad, Niels C.. and Skrabelsrud, Johannes Chr., written from Beseel, (Marseiles?) Illinois, published in Arbeider-foreningers blad, which details writers' modes of travel from Quebec to Chicago and lauds the good living and ample work opportunities. There is a reference to the Ole Bull colony; letters from Westby, Wis., Willmar, MN (Tønnes Mygland, Bekkestua, owner. 1853-1922).

Norwegian-born railroad worker in Illinois, encouraging immigration. Reference to Ole Bull. Published in Det norske Arbeiderblad. Photostatic copy of a letter by Johnsen, Ole, (1854), published in Arbeider-foreningernesblad, quoting commodity prices and wages for construction workers, ship-builders, and fishermen, and encouraging emigration. Photostatic copies of excerpts from two letters by Norwegian immigrants in Aftenbladet, 1855-1857

In one the writer describes the early growth of a village on an American frontier. The other expresses an appreciation of the



values and the services of the American public school. Added: 1 report for Sir George Simpson, June 24, 1858. Added May 2, 2012: Knud Fleischer letter to wife, Matilda, Rock County, Wisc.

Letters, 1862-1863

Photostatic copy of a letter by Lars Lee, 1863. Postmaster at South Bend, Minnesota, giving an account of an Indian outbreak in the Norwegian settlement at the South Branch of Watonwan River and including names of those killed and injured. Photostatic copy of a letter from Liberg, O.P. (1863), reprinted in Morgenbladet from Emigranten, dealing with the Indian attack on the Norwegians at Watonwan River, Minnesota. Photostatic copy of a letter from Tøllefsdn, Rønning (1863), included in an article reprinted in Aftenbladet January 22, 1864, from Trøms ø Stiftstidende. Written at Eau Claire, Wisconsin, to parents and relatives, the letter makes reference to the Civil War and the Indian uprising in Minnesota and discourages emigration. Photostatic copy of a letter (1862) from Rasmussen, Peter Andreas (1829-1898) published in Morgenbladet and addressed to Rasmussen's brother. In this letter he sets forth the reasons for his parting company with Elling Eielsen. See Gerhard Rasmussen file and

Letters, 1864-1866

Photostatic copy of letter (Illinois, Tiskiwo) published in Addressebladet May 31 and June 7, 1864. An account of travels in various parts of America: Gaspe fishing banks, northern Michigan, Milwaukee, and Illinois. References are made to the Civil War and to the land sale system. Photostatic copy of letter (Illinois, Traverce City, 1864), published in Adressebladet December 31, dealing with work and wages in lumber yard, construction work, and sawmill. Writer regrets leaving Norway. Photostatic copy of letter (translated by Elaine Nordlie, Oct. 6, 2014) from Niels Jacobsen and Sjur D. Wilson (1864), to the editor of Emigranten and reprinted in Aftenbladet December 2, 1864, by members of Company D of the Sixth Iowa Calvary Regiment. The letter, written at Fort Rice, Dakota, September 27, describes the two month march against the Indians from Fort Sully to Fort Rice. Jacobsen was a Civil War veteran and later lived at Hills, Minnesota. (see Ulvestad Nordmaend ene i Amerika, Iste del, pp. 294,340). Photostatic copy of letter (Minnesota, Zumbrota -1864), published in Addressebladet April 9. References are made to the Civil War and a gold mine in Idaho. Photostatic copy of a letter from Nilsen, Andr. M., (1865), written at Stillwater, Minnesota, admonishing his countrymen not to emigrate to America because of health, economic, and religious conditions. The letter was published in Adressebladet. Photostatic copy of a letter written by Mikkelsen, Nils, (1866), and published in Emigranten and reprinted in Hamars budstikke. An appeal for settlers, this letter written at Holmes City by the first Norwegian in Douglas County, Minnesota, describes the topography, vegetation, and wildlife and gives the names of the Norwegians already in the county. Photostatic copy of a letter (Minnesota, Dodge County -1866), published in Adressebladet February 6, 1867, giving an account of the journey from Christiania to the Town of Canestic. Photostatic copy of a letter from Øihaugen, Ole T. (1866), signed by Øihaugen and others and published in Adressebladet October 17, 1866. Writing from the quarantine ship "Illinois", the authors make complaints of treatment and conditions on ship passage to America.

Adam Løvenskjold Report, November 22, 1847 Photostatic copy of an excerpt from the report by the Norwegian-Swedish consul in New York to his government on the Norwegian settlements in the West dated October 15, 1847, and published in Morgenbladet November 22, 1847. The report contains data on housing, water supply, forests, soil, health, wages, prices, taxes, crops, farm stock, wild life, American freedom, church situation especially in Luther Valley and Koshkonong, and number of families in each settlement. A copy of this report is in the possession of the Wisconsin Historical Society, and an English translation of it by Knut Gjerset, appears under the title "An Account of the Norwegian Settlers in North America," in the Wisconsin Magazine of History, 8:77-88 (September 1924). Ole S. Bohn "Uncle Ole" (1859-1941) collected family letters and photographs, 1900-1940

(Donated by Owen Anderson, June 2010. Accessioned November 15, 2010. All items found on a CD). Notes from Owen Anderson: Simon T Bohn's uncle, born 18 October 1859 and immigrated to the US in 1869. He probably came to Bear Creek, but by the time I knew him he lived in a little place in Grand Meadow. He died there in 1941 and Grandpa Bohn was the executor of his estate. His estate of several thousand dollars was distributed to his brothers and sisters and/or their descendents; those in the US promptly in 1941, and those in Norway in 1942 and after the end of the war in 1946. I have the thank you letters sent to Simon after the receipt of the money. Of course, the ones from people in the U.S. are in English and those from Norway in Norwegian. I also have the collection of letters Ole received from Norway starting in 1900 and continuing until about 1940. They are mostly from Guri his youngest sister but a few from other family members. He owned a lot with house in Grand Meadow where he died. At one time he owned a farm in Clayton township, Mower county, Minnesota. That was the farm in Clayton township which Thrond owned and sold to Simon and is the one where I remember my grandparents living. Ole frequently helped Grandpa Bohn on the farm and did the chores when Grandpa was away.

Engebret A. Lie letter, 1867-1869

(A Washington Prairie, Decorah, Iowa congregation member) letter to Rev. Johannes Belsheim, Sør-Varanger, Sydvaranger, Norway (July 30, 1869). Lie comments on the current state of Norwegian-American Lutheran Church and issue of whether slavery is a sin or not; mentions Rev. C.L. Clausen (file includes donated Kirkelig Maanedstidende for den Norsk-Evangelical Lutheran kirke i Amerika. (Church Monthly, January 1867).

Hanshus family letters, 1888-1906

Added April 24, 2009: 20-25 letters to family in Soknedalen, Norway (all letters translated). Jens Hanshus, who immigrated at age 17 to Washburn, Wisconsin, is the main contributor. Trained as a tailor, initially he could only find work in a sawmill (carried water to 180 men in the mill). His letters detail the hardships faced by immigrants. One particular letter provides his understanding of the 1884 Presidential election. Jens writes, "As far as the times in America, it is very bad. It is not America any longer now, and this I write for the most from the new president-elect." Other authors include Even J. Dragseth (Washburn, Wis., 1888); Jens Nilsen (Menomonie, Wis., 1899); Kjersti Anshus (North Menomonie, 1899); Oline Hanshus (Eau Claire, Wis., 1899); Ingeber Solenes (Chippewa Falls, Wis., 1903); John Anshus; Carrie Anshus.

Roar L. Irgens correspondence, 1951-2008

Correspondence with his mother and sister in Norway, some translated. He emigrated from Trondheim in 1950, served in the U.S. Army (1952-54), and later obtained a Ph.D. in microbiology (1963). Irgens taught at the University of Illinois and later at Missouri State University. His experiences involved field work in Antarctica, first at Palmer Station, and the following year at McMurdo Station.

Tor Valle collected immigrant letters, 1902-1961

Three distinct subsets, including: (5) family correspondence (18 letters written between 1947 and 1961 from locations Colorado, Illinois, and Minnesota) from Oline Skylstad Kvistad, born in 1869 at Hjørundfjord (present-day Ørsta) to Synnøve Nordang, Stettevik, Ålesund, Norway; (6) purchased family correspondence (22 letters written between 1906 and 1911 from locations in North Dakota, mostly Buffalo and Walcott) to Louise Lahren, Ft.
