## RESOLUTIONS

# Sons of Norway Lodges Invited To Support NAHA

Because the Sons of Norway lodges have frequently declared themselves to be in sympathy with the movement to preserve the records and make public historical facts pertaining to the Norwegian-Americans, each lodge has been invited to support the NAHA. The secretary's office recently completed writing a letter (in all 220) to the secretary of each Sons of Norway lodge, inviting its membership to consider one of two proposals: That the lodge enroll as a Life Member, or that it purchase a complete set of our available publications—for its own library or for a local library of the lodge's choice.

NAHA members who are also members of a Sons of Norway lodge can assist by speaking for the proposals when they come up for discussion and by explaining what a significant contribution the lodge would make to its own community and to the cause of American history if it accepts one or both of our proposals.

## The Archives

Miss Beulah Folkedahl began working on the manuscript collection November 28. She is currently working on the Helge Høverstad Collection. Because this collection contains nearly all possible categories—letters, sermons, lectures, poems, newspaper clippings, etc. — it has been chosen as our target collection. In a word, it will serve as a blueprint for the organization of other collections.

Descriptions of each collection will appear in forthcoming News Letters and later will be issued in pamphlet form.

## Norwegian Immigrant Music

Gerhard M. Cartford, University of Minnesota, is preparing a doctoral thesis entitled A Study of Music in the Life of the Norwegian Immigrants to the United States, 1825-1925. He has worked in our archives for the past month.

While he expressed delight with the materials he found in our collection, he believes that many significant sources are still located in homes, churches, schools and other institutions. He has in mind particularly books and articles on music and musicians among Norwegian Americans, family histories of musicians, old song books, church rituals, congregational histories, sheet music, choir songs, and information about such social customs as folk dancing and folk songs.

## Some Recent Publications

Norstog-Nelson Translation of Halvor

Halvor, A Story of Pioneer Youth, by Peer Strømme 1893, translated and adapted by Inga B. Norstog and David T. Nelson, published by Luther College Press, is now available at the Luther College Book Store. Price (paper) \$1.95.

The translation preserves the sincere, unpretentious and warm qualities of the original. David T. Nelson, responsible for the adaptation, has, in fact, improved upon the original by deleting two chapters which digressed from the central narrative. Omissions of other irrelevant detail help to make it artistically a more compact work.

#### Poetry

Congratulations are in order to two faithful members, Søren C. Roinestad, Oakland, California, and Orlando Ingvoldstad, Chicago, Illinois. Each has recently published a volume of poems.

Roinestad's True to Life Stories and Poems is a fine collection of poetic interpretations dealing with the Old World and the New. We note a nostaglic poem,

"To Minnesota." Printed by Hawes Printing Co., Oakland. Price \$2.50.

Ingvoldstad's neat little book, Beyond Our Dreams, contains 150 poems treating topics as varied as life itself; it includes poetic sermons, hymns, character studies, nature descriptions, and deals with war, sorrow, and humor. His nature descriptions are particularly impressive, as is evident in the opening lines of "Pickerel Point."

A pair of herons stood so still
Amidst the willows in the bay;
The morning thrush sang on the hill
While waiting—dawn seemed far away—
Then bursting brightness of the sun . . .
