

Eugene L. Fevold, Convention Speaker

Eugene L. Fevold, professor of church history at Luther Theological Seminary, St. Paul, Minnesota, will give the main address at the dinner following our triennial meeting on Saturday, May 14. He will speak on "The Norwegian Immigrant and His Church."

Born at Minnewaukan, North Dakota, Professor Fevold received his A.B. dedegree from St. Olaf College, studied theology at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, and received his Ph.D. from the Divinity School at the University of Chicago. His dissertation was entitled Norwegian-American Lutheranism, 1870-1890.

Before becoming professor of church history at Luther Seminary in 1956, he taught religion at Concordia College, Moorhead, Minnesota, and served a pastorate at West Fargo, North Dakota. He studied in Norway under a Fulbright grant in 1954-55.

He and E. Clifford Nelson co-authored the first volume of a two-volume hisEUGENE L. FEVOLD

tory entitled The Lutheran Church among Norwegian-Americans (Minneapolis, 1960). Dr. Nelson wrote the second volume.

We are fortunate in getting Professor Fevold as our speaker. He is a scholar who has specialized in a field of history which is of immediate concern and interest to the Association.
