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MEET THE NEW OFFICERS AT NAHA

Lois Rand served on the NAHA Board for 15 years and then took a 3 year break only to return in April as President of the Association. We are delighted she is willing to help NAHA grow and become stronger.

Lois has always had a strong interest in history, the written word, and her Norwegian-American heritage. Lois grew up in South Dakota and has lived in a variety of locations. She earned both her B.A and her M.A in music from Colorado College in Colorado Springs.

In 1975 Lois married Sidney Rand. Her interest in preserving Norwegian-American history was increased because she and Sidney were constantly representing a Norwegian-American college while Sidney was president of St. Olaf College. In 1980 President Jimmy Carter appointed Sidney to serve as the United States Ambassador to Norway. The Rands joined the diplomatic world and learned about life in Norway. Upon returning to the U.S., Sidney was a popular interim president for colleges in the upper Midwest. Happily the Rands are now living in Northfield again!

John R. Tunheim was elected Vice-President. Jack has been on the Board for 9 years and is a graduate of Concordia College in Moorhead and the University of Minnesota Law School. He is also the author of a book about the Norwegian Americans in his home county, *A Scandinavian Saga: Pioneering in New Folden Township, Marshall County, Minnesota, 1882-1905.* Jack is a U.S. District Court Judge who from 1994-1998 served as the Chair of the U.S. Assassination Records Review Board, an independent federal agency in charge of declassifying the government records of the Kennedy Assassination. He and his wife Kathy live in Stillwater, Minnesota, and are the parents of a daughter in college and a son still at home.

The NAHA Board members elected **Brian Rude** to serve as Secretary of the Association. Brian is a graduate of Luther College in Decorah and obtained his M.A in public administration and public policy from the University of Wisconsin, Madison. After many years of service in the Wisconsin State Senate, Brian recently entered life in the private sector with Dairyland Power. DID YOU KNOW?

NAHA received a request for information from a new television program on the Home and Garden Channel. The program is called "How's That Work?" and is about common household appliances. Every time we take a warm shower, run the dishwasher or do laundry we can thank Edwin Ruud, a Norwegian American, for inventing the water heater! In 1897 Rudd established the Ruud Manufacturing Company, which became one of the largest water-heater manufacturers in the United States. Ruud was born in Askim, Norway in 1854 and came to America in 1880. The University of Pittsburgh conferred a Doctor of Science degree upon Ruud in 1927, and the Norwegian government awarded him the Order of St.Olaf. Ruud died in 1932. The company eventually became the Ruud/Rheem Company and has recently been sold to a Japanese company. Thank you Mr. Ruud!

SNOWSHOE THOMPSON FOLLOW UP

O.J. Tomson, of NAHA's finance committee has given NAHA a striking sculpture of John A. "Snowshoe" Thompson. The artwork is a miniature of a sculpture dedicated in 2001 at a ceremony in Genoa, Nevada, where "Snowshoe" was buried 125 years earlier.

"Snowshoe" carried the U.S. mail across the Sierra Nevada mountains from Genoa to Placerville, California, during the Gold Rush days when no other means of transportation was successful. Having emigrated in 1837 from Tinn, Telemark, Norway, to Wisconsin and Illinois, "Snowshoe" farmed near Mt. Horeb, Wisconsin, prior to heading for California in 1851 with his half-brother, Tore. Married and with a son, Snowshoe supplemented his gold-mining income by responding to an ad by the U.S. Postal Service. Crafting skis like he remembered using in Norway, Snowshoe soon became a hero by saving stranded pack trains, rushing medicines to needy residents, and keeping relatives and businesses in touch until the east-west railroad link was completed. St. Olaf emeritus professor of history Kenneth Bjork devotes one chapter of his *West of the Great Divide* to Snowshoe's remarkable exploits. Many others have studied Snowshoe's impact upon early California history as well as his roots in Tinn, Norway. NAHA and St. Olaf are indebted to O.J. Tomson for his gift of the Snowshoe Thompson sculpture prominently displayed in the Heritage or Norway rooms within Buntrock Commons, the student center. Be sure to ask to see it when you visit St. Olaf's campus.

RECEIVED AT THE ARCHIVES

Received from Delores Thorson Lewis, the centennial and 125th Anniversary books for Centennial Lutheran Church in Des Moines, Iowa. Approximately 40 pages each, soft-cover. Founded in 1876 by Norwegian immigrants, this congregation shows the important groups within the congregation and the shift to a more urban congregation now serving a non-Scandinavian population. Photos of former pastors are included.

Received from Gary Morgan, *Foto Cavalcade Bilder fra Norges Frigjøring 7 Mai- 30 Juni 1945.* Soft-cover approximately 50 pages with photos showing the jubilation upon the liberation of Norway. Descriptions in both Norwegian and English.

Received from Marlys Lien Holth, *From Sod Breaking* to Space Flying-the Anderson Families, Soft-cover, 93 pages. This family history looks at the five children of Anders and Oline Mikkelsdatter Kristensen. Photos add to the family stories.

Received from Marlys Lien Holth, *Roots and Branches*, - *Slaatstuen and Lundsten Families*. Soft-cover, 142 pages. This family history traces the relatives of Anton Gjestvang and Susanna Lund Gjestvang. Includes photos and addresses.

Received from Marlys Lien Holth, *Asprusten Heritage*. Soft-cover, 197 pages. Asprusten is the name of the farm near Åmot and Rena in Østerdalen Norway where the family lived before they settled in the United States. Includes photos and addresses of living descendents.

Received from Kirsti Alette Blomvik, *Døtre af Norge -Heritage, Sisterhood, and Self-reliance: The Evolution and Significance of the Daughters of Norway 1897-1950.* 171 pages, soft-cover. This is a thesis presented to the Department of English, the Norwegian University of Science and Technology. A statement made in 1924 by Dr. Ingeborg Rasmussen, "It is the Daughters of Norway and the other women's clubs which most of all keep Norwegian-ness alive in America" provided the inspiration for this study. The author examines the creation of the Daughters of Norway in the Midwest and its expansion to the West Coast states before the merger with Sons of Norway in 1950.

Received from Garth Ulrich, *Dovre* - 75 years (1914-1989) soft-cover, approximately 80 pages. 75th Anniversary publication of Dovre Lutheran Church, Spalding, Saskatchewan. All baptisms, parents and sponsors are listed, as well as the confirmation classes. Pastors, marriages and funerals are also listed. Church Women Executives are listed for each year. Brief histories are also included for the smaller congregations of Big Stone Lutheran, Bethany English Lutheran, and Good Hope Lutheran, all of which had dissolved decades earlier.

Received from Garth Ulrich, *The Mortensen Family* from Grue, Solør, Norway: the Descendants of Morten Olsen and Kari Paulsdatter. Spiral-bound, approximately 250 pages. Includes photos, copies of records, obituaries, 50th and 60th Anniversary accounts and much more.

Received from Garth Ulrich, The Descendents of

Gulbrand and Siri Anderson. Three-ring binder, approximately 400 pages. Gulbrand and Siri left Valdres in 1881 and came to the United States. Over time they had 12 children. Each of the 12 children and their descendants have a chapter dedicated to their expanding numbers. Includes photos, biographical sketches, important dates, and copies of newspaper articles.

Received from Charles Akre, *The Akre Family*, compiled by Charles Akre in 2001, soft-cover approximately 30 pages. The publication lists the resources available within the family and some of the ancestors who left Norway and the descendents who have grown up in America. Also includes memories and stories from Pastor Charles Akre.

Received from Aldora Lee, *My Childhood Memories*, soft-cover, 52 pages. Includes charming, daily accounts of growing up on a farm near Kenyon, Minnesota, with all the work that needed to be done. The detailed accounts of laundry days, party phone lines, mowing the lawn, greasing the windmill, taking milk to the creamery, rendering lard, butchering chickens, and the multitude of steps involved with cooking and preserving food for a larger family make this an educational booklet.

Received from Lloyd Svendsbye, *Valdres Byygdebok: Gardar og slekter i Vang, Books A, B ,C.* Published in 1985, 1990 and 1991.

Received from Lee Rokke, *The Sigdalslag 1949*. This is the English translation of sixth book of the Sigdalslag, originally published in 1949. Hard-cover, 198 pages, with information about people from Sigdal, Eggedal and Krødsherad in America. Includes some photos, letters and stories written by people before and after WW II. Received from Chris Rotto Hefte, *Rotto*, approximately 400 pages, Three-ring binder. The family history follows the three Rotto siblings who came to America in the 1860s and 1870s. The book traces their descendents as well as their remaining family in Norway. Includes general information about Norway, English translations of articles written in Norwegian, copies of photos, plat maps, newspaper articles, copies of immigration records and much more.

Received from Chris Rotto Hefte, You Should Know of My Life - A Collection of Family Letters about Reverend Isaac Rotto. Spiral-bound, approximately 200 pages. Rotto was son of Norwegian immigrants and served Norwegian Lutheran congregations in various North Dakota parishes. Rotto died at the age of 51 and left nine children behind, all of whom are graduates of Luther College.

Received from Anita Hillesland Londgren, *Meet the Myrstøls and Look Back a Thousand Years*. Soft-cover, 40 pages. Includes copies of photographs, lists of descendents and stories of the life in the America. The life on the prairies was quite a contrast with their former lives in Norway. One relative farmed in Kansas until he went crazy from all the sun and was confined to a mental hospital before he died of a lung disease.

Received from Helen Lokken, *The History of Amund and Margit Ulsaker Bakke Family 1664-1998*. Approximately 400 pages, hard-cover. Includes maps, photos, copies of newspaper clippings, obituaries, family trees diagrams and letters.
