

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
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
Having seen all sights of interest in Bergen, we take a trip on the famous, scenic



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
Amundsen, Johan Bojer, Knut Hamsun and others. We are even invited to the Royal family.

The summer at Spitzbergen only lasts two months. It is therefore of great interest to study this little country island.






