GENERAL MEETING OCTOBER 30, 1999

The Twenty-fifth Triennial Meeting of the Norwegian-American Historical Association will be called to order on Saturday, October 30th at 3:30 p.m. at the Minnesota Humanities Center in St Paul, 987 East Ivy Avenue. The Center provides free, on-site parking as well as handicapped accessible parking. The schedule for the day includes: 1:00 p.m. Executive Board meeting, Library Room; 3:30 p.m. General meeting, Library Room, followed by a meeting of the newly elected board for the purpose of electing officers for the upcoming triennium. At 5:30 p.m. there will be a social hour with cash bar in the Atrium. At 6:30 dinner will be served in the Commons.

President Lawrence O. Hauge will preside over the general meeting, including reports from the Publications, Archives, and Finance committees. The Nominating Committee (appointed by the President) will present a slate of candidates and the main item of business will be the election of a new board of directors. Nominations from the floor are also in order.

Our dinner speaker will be former U.S.Vice-President, and former Ambassador, the Honorable Walter F. Mondale. We are privileged to have this distinguished Life member of NAHA share with us his recent experiences as the U.S. Ambassador to Japan. We know he will also reflect on how he has been influenced by his Norwegian-American heritage and upbringing throughout his years of public service.

Prince Haakon Visit

With almost 500 guests in attendance, HRC Crown Prince Haakon was welcomed June 7th to the Radisson South Hotel in Edina, Minnesota, for a festive benefit banquet. Prince Haakon made his first official visit to the Midwest after completing his political science studies at the University of California in Berkeley. The Norwegian-American Historical Association and other Norwegian-American organizations, Mindekirken, The Norwegian Memorial Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, Vesterheim Museum, Decorah, Iowa, and the Sons of Norway Foundation, Minneapolis, will each receive one quarter of the banquet proceeds. June 7th was a special date for Norwegians and the royal family. It was on June 7, 1940, that the royal family left for Great Britain in the face of encroaching Nazi occupation. It was also on June 7, 1945, that the royal family returned to Norway. We were pleased to have NAHA well represented at the head table with young Prince Haakon. President Lawrence Hauge, his wife Lois, Lois Rand and her husband Sidney, former Ambassador to Norway, and John Tunheim and his wife Kathryn all had roles in the evening's proceedings.

Additions to the Archives

• Received from Joralf Gjerstad, his *I Vesterled Snåsninger og andre nordmenn;* hard cover, 115 pages. A topical study of the emigration from Snåsa that begins with discussions of Ole Rynning and Bernt Julius Muus. The concluding chapter concerns the author's own trip to the United States in 1996, which included returning the records (minutes) of the Snåsalag i Amerika. Håkon Seem, the last secretary of Snåsalaget, died at his daughter's home during a 1958 Norway visit. Among the things he left were the minutes. These records have been added to the NAHA bygdelag collection.

• Received from Christine Klinger, her 1999 dissertation entitled "Between the Immigrant Novel and the Fairytale: The Quest for Happiness in Selected Novels by O. E. Rølvaag." Ms. Klinger compares the immigrant novel with the fairy tale from a vantage point that Rølvaag was a writer between two countries, two cultures, two languages as well as two opposing literary schools: romanticism and realism. The quest for happiness is examined as well as Rølvaag's characters: the immigrants who may contain some of the Ash Lad's special qualities. Hard bound, 88 pages.

• Received from Stephen A. Sheldahl, *Searching for Roots: A Study of Ancestors*, soft bound volume with index, photos, 248 pages. Details the learning process and the results of finding "treasures" of family photos and history when an aunt died. The family emigrated from the Etne area.

• Received two copies of the June, 1999, Varland Vanguard family newsletter, from Walt and Elaine Varland in Cincinnati, Ohio. Circulation is now over 250 in the United States and Norway. Keep up the good work.

• Received from Robert W. Wilman, a 53-page family tree for the descendants of Elling Johannessen Saxhaug and Marie Christensdatter Odlaug. Wilman has also supplied the ancestors for the Saxhaugs as far back as 1660. After arriving in America, the descendants settled in Ashland, Wisconsin, and in the area around Puyallup, Washington.

• Received from Anna Francis, a three-volume set entitled Norwegian Immigrants and Their Ancestors in Doniphan County, Kansas. These transcribed newspaper articles deal with Norwegian immigrants and their descendants. The area was settled in 1869, originally named East Norway, later undergoing a name change to Moray, Kansas. The articles chronicle weddings, births, graduations, church picnics, and tragedies of these pioneers from 1874 through 1941. This interesting addition to the archives expands our understanding of the Norwegian Americans in the plains state of Kansas.

• Received from the University of Iowa Press, *The Follinglo Dog Book: A Norwegian Pioneer Story from Iowa* by Peder Gustav Tjernagel (1864-1932). Originally recorded in 1909, the author wrote stories involving his neighbors and relatives in Story county, Iowa. A charming cast of humans and their canines experience the hard work, seasons, and events of farm life around the turn of the century. The author's grandson, Peter Harstad, director of the Indiana Historical Society, ties everything together with a prologue and epilogue. 240 pages, University of Iowa Press, 1-800-621-2736. This will supplement the Nehemias Tjernagel papers already in the archives.

• Received from Constance J. Ternes four *bygdebøker:Gards- og ættesoge for Nesset*, volume 5, by Kaare Bakkevig, 1985; *Bygdebok for Eid*, by Karl Myskja, 1987; *Bygdebok for Lesja* 2 and *Bygdebok for Lesja 3*, by Arnfinn Kjelland, 1992 and 1996, respectively.

Lloyd Hustvedt Legacy Gift


