# 1974

Steady progress is the hallmark of 1974. Two publications were distributed to the members: *Pioneer Churchman* and volume 26 of *Studies*. The Theodore C. Blegen Memorial Fellowship Fund more than reached its goal of \$30,000. More members were added than lost, and book sales mounted to a new record. Significant material continues to find its way to our Archives. There was a marked increase in gifts from the membership at large. There was also sadness. Two valuable members of our Executive Board died: Dr. Richard W. Giere and Norman O. Olson.

Inflation, of course, is a problem. No program cutbacks are foreseen, but it is quite possible that earlier reserves created through frugal management will now be tapped. In face of increased costs, ranging from postage to printing, the Executive Board decided to increase associate dues to \$10, and sustaining dues to \$15. This increase will go into effect in 1976.

#### Воокѕ

A total of 744 books were sold in 1974 for a gross income of \$3,936.56. The earlier record for sales was in 1972, with a total of \$3,618.42. *Pioneer Churchman* led the sales with 169 copies; *Studies*, volume 26, was second with 127. *Norwegian Migration: The American Transition* was third with 106. Out of 54 publications, 16 are out of print. Of the remaining 38 books still in print, 14 have inventories less than 100. Total copies in stock, as of December 31, stood at 6,417, representing a potential income of \$30,000.

#### ARCHIVES

Charlotte Jacobson, formerly a librarian at St. Olaf College, began in September to process the backlog of material accumulated since the death of Beulah Folkedahl in 1971. This marks the most significant development for the Archives in 1974. Miss Jacobson has been a long-time friend of the Association. Her gift of \$500 some years ago made possible the purchase of document cases for our manuscript collection. Family histories lead the categories of materials being donated to the Archives. The Rølvaag family turned over the balance of the O. E. Rølvaag papers in their possession.

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

Ninety-seven members were added in 1974. There were eighty-four cancellations.

## Editorial

#### THE ENDOWED CHAIR

A Chinese proverb comes to mind when we consider an endowed chair in immigration studies: "Even if the journey be 1000 miles, the first step must be taken." The Executive Board at its February meeting decided to allocate future undesignated gifts to this cause. St. Olaf College has included a plan for such a chair in its Centennial Fund Drive. It follows that the NAHA should match the efforts of the college so that the envisioned professorship can serve both the college and the Association.

Culture is a difficult thing to define, and no effort will be made to do so here, but certainly its inner essence must be made up of durable values. In a word, if our Sesquicentennial and our own Fiftieth anniversary are to have lasting cultural significance, celebration must be combined with a commitment to the future. The "durable value" which rose out of the Centennial in 1925 was clearly the NAHA itself. When that celebration was over, the hard and persistent work began which is still going on today. An endowed chair has similar qualities of durability, and, at the moment at least, it is the only aspiration for sustained follow-through after the festivities of 1975. The endowed chair may, in fact, approach something of a proving ground for how far the Norwegian Americans view themselves as a durable cultural entity in American society. This writer believes that Norwegian Americans like "1000 mile journeys," even though they may balk and grumble a bit on the way — but this is just to pass the time.

#### 50TH ANNIVERSARY

The Association will celebrate its 50th anniversary Saturday, September 27, at St. Olaf College. The organizing convention was held at this college on October 6, 1925. The anniversary committee felt that it was appropriate that the festivities should be held at the site of origin and as close to October 6 as possible.

The year also calls for a triennial meeting, which will take place at 2:00 in the

afternoon. The Executive Board will meet in the forenoon. The anniversary banquet is scheduled for 6:00 in the evening. Many of the details regarding the program remain to be settled. The main speaker will be Professor Rudolph Vecoli of the University of Minnesota, one of the leading immigration scholars of our time. Members are urged to note the date and make plans for attending both the afternoon business meeting and the evening banquet.

#### FORTHCOMING PUBLICATIONS

A Folk Epic: The Bygdelag in America, by Odd S. Lovoll, should be available for distribution to the members in late April or early May. This book is published under our agreement

with Twayne Publishers.

The Norwegian-Americans, by Arlow W. Andersen, though not our publication, will be distributed to all members of the Association. A direct purchase of sufficient copies will be made by the NAHA from Twayne Publishers. No date has been established for distribution, but it will be some time in 1975.

The anniversary history of the NAHA, prepared by Odd Lovoll and Kenneth O. Bjork, will be printed by North Central Publishing Company in St. Paul. North Central has promised prompt service. This booklet should be available on

August 1.

Last fall, as a part of its Centennial celebration, St. Olaf College sponsored a Rølvaag Symposium. The proceedings of this symposium, which includes lectures by Robert Scholes and Einar Haugen and shorter papers by other Rølvaag scholars, will be published by the College. Members of the Association may send their orders for this book to the Secretary's office. The exact publication date is unknown, but all orders will be held on file. Cost \$2.50.

#### LIFE MEMBERSHIPS

Again we want to encourage associate members to consider a life membership. The advantages are mutual. From the long range view it is more economical and it assures the member against future increases in dues. On the other hand, it assures the Association against possible cancellation of membership, and reduces clerical and mailing costs because the annual collection of dues is eliminated.
