Thank You, Sons of Norway

During the past few months, 11 Sons of Norway lodges have become members of the Association, and the significance of this should be noted. They are leading the way, as it were, for a new concept, THE CONCEPT BEING THAT RE-GARDLESS OF WHATEVER IMMEDI-ATE OBJECTIVES A NORWEGIAN AF-FILIATED ORGANIZATION MIGHT HAVE, IT ALSO HAS AN OBLIGATION TO HISTORY. It is our hope and wish that not only the remaining lodges, but all other organizations made up of Norwegian Americans, will be stimulated to similar action.

The enthusiasm of the Supreme Lodge in Minneapolis for the NAHA became more than evident in the February issue of **Sons of Norway.** One full page was devoted to our managing editor, Dr. Bjork, and to a listing of our publications (p. 26). In an editorial (p. 24) entitled "Let's Look at History," Einar O. Hammer, editor of **Sons of Norway**, strongly endorsed the work of the Association: "This is a record," he wrote, "without parallel among the many ethnic groups who came to the new world to settle, conquer and develop the wilderness continent. . . .

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Buslett and Ristad Papers Organized

BUSLETT, OLE AMUNDSON (1855-1924). PAPERS, 1873-1925. 1 file case.

Papers of a Norwegian-born author, poet, journalist, legislator, and merchant in Northland, Wisconsin.

The papers consist largely of letters received by Buslett, and deal with such subjects as local church problems, bi-lingualism in the church, criticism of current Norwegian-American writings, materialism among Norwegian-Americans, Wisconsin exhibit at Norway's Independence Centennial in 1914, a State Park in Door County, Wisconsin. The letters by Buslett are to his wife.

In the general correspondence file are letters from James O. Davidson, Herman Ekern, George Flom, Olaf Huseby, Simon Johnson, Ole Jørgens, O. L. Kirkeberg, Oscar O. Odegaard, Halle Steensland.

Among the papers are a review of O. E. Rølvaag's *Paa Glemte Veie*, a copy of *Wergelands Talsmand* (Stevens Point, 1886), a roster of small towns in the United States with Scandinavian names arranged by states, articles on woman suffrage and socialism, reports from the Wisconsin Good Roads Committee of 1909, as well as poems, newspaper clippings, and book manuscripts. The biographical miscellany folder contains a bibliography of Buslett's works, compiled by the archivist.
