#### INTERESTED IN A NAHA BOOK GROUP?

Editor's note: I learned of an informal book group that reads and then meets to discuss NAHA's publications. I asked them to share with us what got them started. For several years many of my NAHA books went unread. My intentions were good but I just did not find the time. All of that changed a few years ago when three of us from South Minneapolis formed a NAHA reading group. Now our books are being read and discussed. We look forward to new publications.

Since we had a lot of catching up to do we decided to read some of NAHA's earlier publications. We were drawn to the diaries and correspondence of the early Norwegian immigrants who came to minister to their countrymen and women in Wisconsin and Iowa.

One of our favorites was *The Diary of Elizabeth Koren* (NAHA 1955). We never cease to be amazed with the sacrifices these devoted people made when they gave up a comfortable life in Norway to come "til Amerika" to preach God's word. A recent trip to Koren's Washington Prairie church outside of Decorah, Iowa helped us to further understand their ministry.

Not all who came to the Midwest were immigrants. A few came as observers and lecturers. Among them was a well-known poet, dramatist, novelist and politician Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson. (See Land of the Free, NAHA 1978) His letters written in 1881 and 1882 to his wife Karoline, to the Oslo newspaper "Dagbladet" and to his tour arranger, Rasmus B. Anderson in Madison, Wisconsin gave wonderful insights into this complex man.

Our group tries to meet once a month to discuss our assigned reading. When there is a book signing or an educational activity related to the book, we incorporate that event with our meeting. It can be a great way to expand your knowledge of things Norwegian-American. We hope that we have inspired you to read the books in your collection of NAHA books.

#### NEWS FROM 2001 HAUGEN SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT

Editor's note: I asked the most recent winner of the Einar and Eva Lund Haugen Scholarship to tell us how she used the scholarship money to advance her doctoral studies.

Receiving the Haugen Scholarship last spring was one of the greatest honors of my life. The Haugens' work has influenced and inspired me, from my first days of studying Norwegian as an undergraduate at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, to my current dissertation work on Norwegian-American literature and culture at The Ohio State University. The award also meant a great deal since it came from NAHA, the place that I consider my scholarly "home." I am therefore writing to express my thanks and share some of the singular opportunities and experiences this

generous scholarship afforded.

First and foremost, the scholarship released me from my regular teaching and administrative duties at Ohio State. The precious time off allowed me to devote my summer to dissertation work, the highlight of which was a research trip to Norway from June to July. I spent most of my time in Oslo, using the collections at the University of Oslo and the National Library. During my stay, I lived in a dormitory with Norwegian and foreign students at Kringsjå, a short train ride from the university and the downtown. In addition to working in the libraries, I met with other scholars of Norwegian-American studies and members of NAHA-Norway and the Nordmanns-Forbundet (Norseman's Federation). It was a pleasure for me to discuss my work and spend time with such generous people. I was also fortunate to make two short trips during my stay: one to see family and friends in Bergen, the other to find and photograph the Hans Christian Heg monument in Lier. My visit to the statue was one of the final pieces in an ongoing research project and became a pilgrimage of sorts.

The final stage of my Haugen scholarship will be, quite fittingly, a research trip to the NAHA archives in Northfield this spring. The Haugen Scholarship has allowed me to make important progress on my work, and also reminded me why I love this project and need

to keep at it.

#### ADDITIONS TO THE ARCHIVES

Received from Gordon L. Jacobson, Jacobson Farnily History, Norway-America-Iowa, Their Story: Thron Jacobson and John Thron Jacobson. 478 pages, in binder and 69 page appendix of helpful information and photos. Includes copies of census reports, land grants, farming information, newspaper clippings and much more. Received from Roy Franklin Anderson, Ole Olsen Rykhus's Family History, 67 pages spiral bound. Photos, copies of newspaper articles and documents show the movement and expansion of this family.

Received from Nedra Cook, Norwegian Connections, family history actually completed in Norway and then translated to English for

the family members in the United States.

Received from Bob Kittelson, correspondence from the 1970's and 1980's, between Della Kittelson Catuna and Professor Clarence Clausen as they discussed the translation of the Norwegian

soldiers' letters for Colonel Heg and His Boys.

Received from Leland Sather, Utah Historical Quarterly, Fall 2001, Vol.69, number 4. This quarterly is dedicated to the skiing and winter recreational pursuits in Utah as the state prepares for the 2002 winter Olympics. Of course Norwegian-Americans were involved in skiing activities. The names of Halvor Bjorngaard and Alf Engen are important to Utah's winter sports industry. Bjorngaard left Wanamingo Minnesota and the Aurora Ski Club of Red Wing, Minnesota to undertake the duties of ski professional for the Odgen Ski Club. Tragically Bjorngaard was killed in a motorcycle accident and was buried in Wanamingo in 1931.

Received from Ralph and Marilyn Olson, A Journey From Norway to America, A Chronicle of the Family of Tom and Ellen Olson. This is a narrative to complement the earlier work, Norway to America, the Genealogy and History of the Family of Tom and Ellen Olson. 21 pages, spiral bound. Includes maps and photos of the farm in

Norway as well as photos from family gatherings.

Received from the Valley Grove Preservation Society, documents and records from the church's earliest days, including the deed to the land on which the church stands, the Luther League constitution, the Ladies Aid minutes, communion records and much more. Valley Grove, one of the congregations served by B.J. Muus, discontinued worship services in 1973. However, the grounds and surrounding land are maintained by the Valley Grove Preservation Society, which in 2000 raised money to purchase 111.3 acres of land surrounding the site.

Received from Lawrence Aasen, A Look Back to Ole and Mary Aasen, Their Children and the Early Days. 15 pages, stapled booklet written in 1971. In 1881 Ole spent his first North Dakota winter living in a cave. Later that year Ole married Mary Lein in Fargo, North Dakota. The booklet follows the lives of their six children. Received from Lawence Aasen, Torger and Bertha Brenden, Pioneer Farmers. 8 pages stapled booklet written in 1975. The Brenden family left Spring Grove, Minnesota in 1879 and via covered wagon traveled almost 15 miles a day before arriving in Taft, North Dakota, 350 miles away. Here they broke sod and turned it into a productive farm.

Received from Carl Solberg, Recollections, by Josef Emil Running, loose leaf, 58 pages. Josef's parents emigrated from Dombaas Norway in 1878 and settled in Martin County, Minnesota. Josef, born in 1891, recalls his father treasuring the news from the Skandinaven newspaper and that he was 17 years old before he ever traveled more than 20 miles from home. Josef attended St. Olaf for eight years, while it was both an Academy and a College. Josef became a teacher and Math professor. At age 86 Josef made his first trip to Norway to see the area his family and neighbors had spoken about so frequently. In his best Gubrandsdalen dialect Josef was successful in asking directions to the farm on which his father had lived.

Received from the St. Olaf College archives, 18 copies of Cantata for Soprano, Baritone, Chorus and Orchestra written for the 1825-1925 Norse American Centennial. Text by B.J. Rothnem and Music by F. Melius Christiansen.

Received from Ralph O. Thrane, Who Was Gjertrud Gullisksatter Helle Aamodt Nilsen Nettum? And Where is She Now? A family mystery is explored around a great grandmother who left the Toten area of Norway and settled in the Toten area of Goodhue County. Gjertrud died in 1873 and was buried in the Hoff Lutheran Church Cemetary. For years the only marker was a tree planted by her husband, Johan in 1873. Family lore says Johan brought the spruce seeds with him from Norway. Johan moved with his children to Kindred North Dakota where he lived for another 40 years. Gjertrud's tombstone was moved to North Dakota to be near that of her husband although the actual remains stayed in Goodhue County.

Received from the Royal Norwegian Consulate General in Toronto, Canada "Somewhere on the East Coast of Canada" Norwegian Wartime Activities in Nova Scotia 1940-1943, by Jostein A. Kjelsrud, 119 pages, hard cover. Thousands of Norwegian seamen and soldiers trained as part of their fight to liberate their homeland after the Nazi invasion. Whaling vessels were converted to become convoy escort ships. For security reasons, very few people knew of the activities in Lunenburg, Nova Scotia and it was often referred to only as "somewhere on the east-coast of Canada." This is a very interesting war-time story involving Norwegians doing their part for Norway. In May, King Harald and Queen Sonja will help draw attention to the Norwegian-Canadian Heritage Museum north of Toronto where the Royal Norwegian Air Force trained during W.W. II. The training area for the Royal Norwegian Air Force was named "Camp Little Norway. More than 3,300 officers and crew had their training here between 1940 and 1945

Levorsen and Children from Rollag, Numedal, Norway. Loose leaf,
approximately 80 pages. Pelican Rapids, Minnesota became home for
some of the family before moving to Norge, Virginia. Photos, maps and
reprints of travel letters in the "Rothsay Record" detailed a train trip to
Texas to look for land.
