New Quarters for NAHA

The Association began moving its properties into its new location early in September. The task has now been completed, but a number of things remain to be done before each item can be permanently located. When we are fully settled, the *Newsletter* hopes to carry some pictures of the offices and stack area.

The NAHA is now located on the ground level of the new St. Olaf College library addition and has a private entrance. The floors are carpeted and fluorescent light fixtures run the full length of each stack aisle, giving our quarters a warm and cheerful atmosphere. All NAHA members passing through Northfield are urged to visit the archives.

Arne J. Opsahl Equips NAHA Offices

The new furniture in the NAHA came across the Atlantic as a gift from Arne J. Opsahl of Hamar, Norway. Mr. Opsahl deals in Norwegian furniture on an international scale. His daughter, Anne, graduated from St. Olaf College in 1965. A second daughter, Britt, is currently enrolled.

Mr. Opsahl's magnificent gift included three desks, three upholstered swivel chairs, one upholstered bench, and six chairs, three of them being arm chairs. All of the pieces represent modern Norwegian furniture design.

Executive Board Increased

The revised charter, drawn up by Judge Derwood Johnson and approved by the executive board, was adopted at the triennial meeting held in Minneapolis, May 14, 1966. Among other things the new charter calls for an executive board of eighteen members. Seven new members were added:

- Mr. Henning C. Boe, publisher of the Western Viking, Seattle, Washington.
- Dr. Gunnar Gundersen, physician and surgeon, Gundersen Clinic, La Crosse, Wisconsin. Dr. Gundersen is also president of the Board of Directors of the Norwegian-American Museum.
- Mr. Sevrin A. Haram, prominent New York businessman and importer. Mr. Haram was born in Norway (Haramsøy, not far from Aalesund) and left his homeland for America in 1910.
- Dr. Ole G. Landsverk, chairman of board, Landsverk Electrometer Company, Glendale, California.
- Mr. Norman O. Olson succeeded Andrew E. Wigeland as treasurer of the NAHA. Mr. Olson holds a partnership in Arthur Anderson & Co. (Chicago accounting firm), and is the vice chairman of the firm's Committee on Accounting Principles and Auditing Procedures.
- Dr. Rolf A. Syrdal, professor of religion at Luther College, Decorah, Iowa. He was formerly executive secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions, Evangelical Lutheran Church.
- Mr. Roy N. Thorshov, prominent Minneapolis architect. Mr. Thorshov has for *Continued on page two*

Re-elected President

The new board convened after the general meeting and elected Lionel G. Thorsness as president. Attorney Thorsness is now serving his fourth term in this office. David T. Nelson, Magnus Bjorndal, and Andrew E. Wigeland were chosen as vice presidents. Mr. Wigeland, treasurer since 1950, requested that he be relieved of this office. Norman O. Olson was then elected as treasurer. Lloyd Hustvedt was re-elected as secretary. Miss Beulah Folkedahl was appointed to serve as archivist.

Helmer Blegen, O. I. Hertsgaard, Carl Søyland, Arne Tvete, and Carl E. Moe, were reappointed as regional chairmen.

Historian Wanted

At its annual meeting held in May, the Bygdelagenes Fellesråd (common council for the bygdelags) allocated \$6000 for the publication of a history of the bygdelag movement in America. O. I. Hertsgaard, president of the Fellesråd, stated that his organization hoped that the NAHA would undertake to publish this book, with the Fellesråd paying the printing costs.

Editor Kenneth O. Bjork stated that the Association would be interested in publishing a history of the *bygdelags* provided the manuscript — whenever it becomes available — meets the established publication standards of the NAHA.

Scholars interested in writing such a history should communicate directly with Professor Kenneth O. Bjork, Department of History, University College, P. O. Box 30197, Nairobi, Kenya. This may also be an excellent opportunity for anyone seeking a Ph.D. dissertation topic which might later be published.
