## PROMOTING N. A. H. A.

### -In Illinois

A group of Norwegian-American Historical Association members in the Chicago area sponsored an "Old Settlers" picnic which was held September 25, 1955 at Norway, Illinois.

Five hundred descendants of pioneer settlers from the surrounding sections of Illinois, Iowa and Wisconsin attended the event and re-lived history.

This place has been marked by the State of Illinois as an historic site, where the first Norwegian settlement in the Middle West was established in 1834—122 years ago—the second settlement by Norwegians in modern times, and the forerunner of thousands of similar settlements in Illinois and other states to the north and south. The historic marker is located seventy miles southwest of Chicago.

The new books were a special feature at the annual Friends-of-the-Library Tea observed on Thursday and Friday, April 19 and 20. The local press gave generous space to the event and the four donors were interviewed on a 15-minute radio broadcast telling about the gift of N.A.H.A. books.

# INTERESTING BOOKS COMING —Studies And Records

Volume 19 of Norwegian-American Studies and Records is in the editorial stage of preparation for publication, and it promises to be fully as interesting as previous volumes. The volume will contain about nine articles and the usual bibliographical essay. Subjects covered in the articles will include: an analysis of the significance of "America letters"; a study of Norwegian folk art as preserved in America; a Selbu folk legend; Norwegian emigrants holding university degrees; Norwegian-Danish Methodism on the Pacific coast; Norwegian Mormons; Snowshoe Thompson; and a translated "America letter." An article on H. H. Boyesen's views on emigrants may also be included. It is hoped that the volume can be published by late 1956 or early 1957.

#### —"West Of The Great Divide"

We are happy to announce that the Board of Editors is planning to publish Dr. Kenneth Bjork's study of Norwegian migration to the West Coast in 1957. The book will be titled: "West of the Great Divide; Norwegian Migration to the Pacific Coast, 1847-1900."

According to Dr. Bjork, the volume will contain three chapters on the Scandinavian Mormons; four on early California experience; two on mining activities and settlement in the Rockies; also chapters on the Pacific Northwest, on religious, economic, and social life along the Pacific coast, and on the migration to Alaska. Present plans call for a total of eighteen chapters.

The greater part of the manuscript will be submitted to the Association next fall and the remainder the following spring. It is our hope that the book will be in the hands of our members before the end of 1957.
