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THE 2001 HAUGEN SCHOLARSHIP WINNER ANNOUNCED

The 2001 Haugen Scholarship Committee comprised of Dr. Todd W. Nichol, Dr. Jon Gjerde and Dr. Solveig Zempel is pleased to announce that Kristen Risley, doctoral candidate at the Ohio State University, was selected to receive the 2001 Haugen Scholarship. The Haugen Scholarship, awarded each April, was established to honor Dr. Einar and Eva Lund Haugen. This scholarship is significant in that it allows NAHA to offer some assistance and encouragement to scholars in Scandinavian Studies or Scandinavian-American fields. We need to encourage the next generation to pursue research in this field we find so vital and captivating.

Kristen is pursuing her Ph.D. in the Ohio State University English Department where her dissertation is tentatively entitled, "The Western Home: Place, Culture and Ethnicity in Norwegian-American Literature, 1870-1940." Kristen's undergraduate degree, in English, is from the University of Wisconsin, Madison where she also had a minor in Scandinavian Studies. Kristen will be doing research in Norway this summer as well as planning a trip to the NAHA archives. We look forward to receiving a copy of Kristen's dissertation, and welcome another scholar to this field of study.

WORD FROM THE PUBLISHER - NEXT BOOK!

We are pleased to report that 2001 marks a year where you will receive 2 publications from NAHA. In addition to *Colonel Heg and His Boys* you will be sent the *America-America Letters* book later this fall. The term "America-America letters" calls attention to the multitude of private letters immigrants sent to each other and to communications by readers printed in Norwegian-American newspapers. The letter writers not only address progress, but they also express a great number of

concerns and indicate the many difficulties the immigrants confronted as they adjusted to American society. The vast majority of personal letters did not see print, and were intended exclusively for the eyes of the recipient and thus communicate a greater deal of confidentiality and candor than those intended for a particular newspaper's readership.

The NAHA book contains the family correspondence of the Aaker family - selected mainly from the Association's holdings. The Aaker family emigrated from Upper Telemark in 1845. These letters cover a dramatic period of American history between 1847 and 1894. The book is currently at the printers and should be in your mailbox around Thanksgiving. The *America-America Letters* book will sell for \$24.95. NAHA members may purchase extra copies at the discounted price of \$18.71 plus postage and sales tax for Minnesota residents.

ADDITIONS TO THE ARCHIVES

Received from Borgny Ager - letters from her grandmother to her uncle. Letters were written in Norwegian and translated into English.

Received from Tom Fjelde, Orpha Erdahl and Ruth Hembre, Doorways - from Nordic Fjords...to Iowa Prairies, soft cover, 270 pages. A family history of the Mannsaker (also Mandsager) and Laate families. A family member in Norway contributed the background information on the Odda community where the family originated before settling in the United States. Although the farm was full of rocks and boulders, cutting timber and providing transportation to tourists added income to the meager farm earnings. Information from bygdebooks, family trees, photos of past and present family members and reminiscences are included.

Received from Jerome Reinan, a family tree for the descendents of Lorents Andreas Hagensen Stokmo. 13 pages, loose leaf.

Received from Jerome Reinan, a family tree for the descendents of Lars Iversen Ronningen. 4

pages, loose leaf.

Received from Earl Richard Ensrud, The Amjo Saga. Vol. 1, 255 pages, hard cover. Vol. 2, 99 pages, hard cover. Colonel Joseph Ensrud published this family history in 1958. The Ensrud family home was Wells, Minnesota. The family history encompasses the life of Joseph Ensrud and Amy Foss Ensrud. The couple jointly compiled their life stories shortly before Amy's death. Decorah, Iowa and Mabel, Minnesota were the two places Amy called home until marrying Joseph. Their life as Norwegian Americans in the early part of the century is complete with photos and a detailed family tree.

Received from E.T. and Marj Fjelde, The Church at Four Corners by Everett and Marlene Haibeck Vorthmann, 199 pages, soft cover. This is the story of Bethel Lutheran Church in Braddock, Kidder County North Dakota. The church was also just a few miles from Burleigh, Emmons, and Logan counties. Norwegian immigrants homesteading on the North Dakota prairie founded Bethel Church. Unusual for the time, women voted in the congregational meetings from the very beginning in 1905. The history of the church is the history of the founders and the surrounding communities. Photos, maps, teachers' reports and family stories show the joys and hardships of life on the prairie and through the Depression years. Over time the congregation grew to include immigrants from Germany, Sweden and Russia, but Bethel Lutheran was the common denominator for the community. The church was moved to Moffit in 1962, and family members of those buried in the cemetery restored the cemetery in 1996.

Received from Charles H. Russell, photos of three paintings Elise Wærenskjold brought with her from Norway to Texas. A Wærenskjold relative living in Texas currently owns the three paintings. A still life was painted by Elise before she left Norway. Another painting, "The Holts Prestegaard," portrays Elise's father's last pastorate near Arendal. The third painting is of Lillesand Harbor. Elise owned a home on the other side of the fjord. Also included was a photo of a painting portraying Otto, Elise Wærenskjold's eldest son.

Received from Charles H. Russell, photos of the "Old Norwegian Cemetery" in east Texas. Johan Reiersen's father, Ole, used his own funds to have the remains of these eighty-one victims of disease moved to a proper cemetery before Ole himself died

in 1852.

Received from Christine Rotto Hefte, Blessed to be a Blessing, First Lutheran Church Fergus Falls, Minnesota, 1872-1997. Soft cover, 98 pages. The church history is organized much like a newspaper with headlines and well researched "stories." Local historical societies, newspapers, archives of the Seminary were used to provide rich material and photos for this book. Important events in the life of the church and Ladies Aid are documented. The follow-up for each minister that served at First Lutheran adds a fresh dimension to this church history.

Received from Eunice L. Holz, *Some*Ancestors and Descendents of Olaf Thorbjorn Bang
and Oline Emelie Lohre. Spiral bound, 324 pages.

Received from Helen Ramsey Steers, *The Neighborhood that Was, Memories and Reflections on a Community in Rural Iowa From 1848-1944*, by Chaplain Elling E. Ramsey. Soft-cover, 173 pages. The center of this family story is the Washington Prairie Lutheran Congregation outside of Decorah, Iowa. The author is now 98 years old and shares his

memories and the stories his mother told him about her parents who were among the first to settle the area in 1848. The author uses some of Elizabeth Koren's words to describe the people and conditions in the little farming settlement.

Received from Lars Erik Larson, *Norwegian Emigration to Canada 1850-1874*. The author is an emerit faculty member at University of Wisconsinemeritus Whitewater. Soft cover, 72 pages.

Received from Solveig Zempel, *Laache's Book of Family Prayer*. 736 pages, hardcover. Translated into contemporary English. The Norwegian version of this book was compiled by Bishop Nils Jakob Laache, Bishop at Nidaros Cathedral in Trondheim from 1884-1892. Peer Strømme published an English translation in 1902.

Received from Dina Tolfsby, *Til Væpen for Det Nye Land - Norske Innvandrere I Den Amerikanske Borgerkrig*, by Karl Jakob Skarstein.

368 pages, hardcover.

Received from Sidney A. Rand, the English translation of a novel, *Mor Hansen* written by A.B. Pedersen in Norwegian in the early part of the twentieth century. Translation by Clara Serkland. This will join the original version in the NAHA archives. A.B. Pedersen emigrated from Sigdal to Minnesota where he was one of the first businessmen in Rothsay, Minnesota and one of the founders of the Sigdalslag. Family members believe the events in this novel incorporate activities which either happened to Pedersen or his neighbors while a young man in Norway.

Received from Mildred Drentlaw, Our Enduring Heritage- the Life of a Norwegian-American Family. by Roald Lund. 223 pages, soft cover. Roald writes about his parents and their early life in Norway as well as their busy lives in their new home in Seattle, Washington. Gunnar Lund, the father, was the editor and publisher of the Washington Posten for many years. In addition to family events, the author reviewed the decades by examining the Washington Posten articles of the time. The 1920's provided much about which Norwegians could be proud. This decade also provided transition and change as the language, the Lutheran church and heritage in general was debated all over America. Of special interest was the invitation the government of Norway extended to twelve Norwegian-American journalists in 1927. In addition to Gunnar Lund, A.N. Rygg from Brooklyn's Nordisk Tidene, Christian Prestgaard, of the Decorah Posten, and John A. Anderson from Chicago's Skandinaven all traveled to Norway.
