NAHA CLASSIC TAKES ON A NEW LIFE – AS A PLAY!

June 23- 30, 2002 the Hallingdal Folkemuseum in Nes is performing a play based on the story of Gro Nilsdatter Gudmundsrud. Gro, as a newly married woman, emigrated to Iowa in 1862 with her husband Ole Svendsen Skrattegard. Gro wrote many letters over her short life and these became the basis of the NAHA publication *Frontier Mother* in 1950. Gro died at the age of 37 following the birth of her tenth child. The play will take place in and around the house built by her husband in Northwood, North Dakota. In 1999 the house was transported from North Dakota and re-erected at the Hallingdal Folkemuseum. CALL FOR PAPERS – NAHA-NORWAY

The eighth seminar of the Norwegian-American Historical Association, Norway Chapter, "Norwegian-Americans in a Nation of Nations," will be held on June 25-28, 2003, at the University of Bergen. The seminar organizers welcome a wide range of topics and are particularly interested in papers that emphasize the social diversity of the American environment in which Norwegian immigrants and their descendants have been a part.

NAHA-Norway encourages seminar contributions based on many academic traditions. Literary, historical, social science, fine arts, and cultural studies—as well as multi- and interdisciplinary approaches—are appropriate. NAHA-Norway also emphasizes the need to see Norwegian-American Studies in the context of international migration and ethnic studies in general. Presentations may be delivered in English or Norwegian and, except for invited lectures, should not exceed twenty minutes.

ADDITIONS TO THE ARCHIVES

Received from Ron and Jean Hendrix, *Civil War Diary* of *Gunvold Johnsrud 1841-1923*. Approximately 30 pages, spiral bound. Includes copies of several hand-written letters, a translation of soldier's diary, and a translation of an article from the 1988 "Ringerike" about Gunvold Johnsrud.

Received from Ron and Jean Hendrix, the leather bound "day-book" kept by Gunvold Johnsrud. Johnsrud started the book while serving in the Civil War. The book appears to have started as a ledger for accounts, but turned into a diary of the soldier's experiences. While in the Union Army Johnsrud wrote in English. After returning home the records, church minutes and accounts were written in Norwegian. The record keeping ended in 1896.

Received from author Siri Garborg Talle, *Kjære Bror!: Arne Garborg og slekten.* 340 pages, hard cover. Includes background and letters from family members in Norway and after arriving in different mid-western states and on to California and Washington. Also includes a section of photos from Norway and in the United States.

Received from Hanska officials, *Hanska – A Century* of *Tradition 1901-2001*, 428 pages, hard cover. Starting with the earliest settlers who were Norwegian immigrants, the centennial committee compiled a thorough review of newspaper articles, stories, photos, maps and letters to show the rich history of the community. Hanska has many ties to Norway and Norwegian names are still present in today's residents.

Received from Norman Vinnes, *Trondhjem Norwegian Lutheran Church, Congregation and Annual Meeting Minutes 1896-1929*, Lonsdale, Minnesota. Approximately 100 pages, spiral bound. The Trondhjem Community Preservation Society commissioned the translation of the minutes. The church and cemetery are listed on the National Register of Historical Places. Vinnes earlier translated the 1876-1896 minutes.

Received from Terry Sveine, additions to the ongoing biography of Sveine's ancestors. Approximately 20 pages, stapled. Contains stories relayed from one generation to the next. Sveine's grandfather, Jorgen, was an only child, lonely for friends and playmates. Jorgen married in 1907 and vowed to have a large family so his children would not be as lonely as he had been. 15 children kept the family busy and far from lonely.

Received from Barbara Quinn, *Knud and Anne Dovre Family History*. Approximately 80 pages, in a binder. Includes generational and pedigree charts, photos, maps, family narratives, and obituaries.

Received from Lowell and Nancy Tjentland, *The Jana Lineage from Bondhus*, written by Jan Sandvik, and translated by Åse Bondhus Peckham. 153 pages, loose-leaf note book. Describes the Mauranger area of the Hardanger Fjord, the family overview of those who emigrated to America and the relatives in Norway. Includes copies of photos, handwritten letters and lists of descendents for the relatives and a Bondhus family history written for a St. Olaf class in 1928.

Received from Lois Rand, *Minnehaha County South Dakota - Historical and Biographical Sketches*, 668 pages, hard-bound book. A detailed review of the people, churches, schools, clubs, businesses, families, stories and photos from one of South Dakota's easternmost counties. Rich with many Norwegian-American pioneer families and institutions.


Received from Lois Rand, *A History of South Dakota Century Farms*, 159 pages, hard bound. Includes an overview of the settlement history of South Dakota's farms and ranches including chapters on immigrants, grasshoppers, homesteading, finding a house, rattlesnakes, loneliness and homesickness, the Grange, blizzards as well as brief histories of each century farm.

Received from Darrell L. Trygstad, *Johannes og hans hustra Guruanna*, 376, pages hard-bound book. Reviews the history of Norway, the Norwegian heritage of the Trygstad and Jermstad families from the Verdal kommune, as well as churches and farms. Also includes information on the new home in America and the descendents. Many photos, copies of handwritten documents, letters and maps illustrate life in Norway and in the United States.
