SURVEY OF 1963

The past year has been one of continued growth for the NAHA. The new Authors Series was launched, and its first volume, Hjalmar Hjorth Boyesen, came off the press late in October. Also, before the close of the year, Volume 22 of Studies and the late Carl L. Lokke's Klondike Saga were in advanced stages of editing. Miss Beulah Folkedahl has worked steadily on the manuscripts. The NAHA periodical collection has been organized; all duplicates and periodicals falling outside of our scope of interest have been culled out, providing us with much-needed space. A new record was set for book sales, and there has been an apparent increase in memorial gifts and direct donations.

The membership picture is less encouraging, showing a net gain of only three members. Of the 38 new members added in 1963, 31 were Associate, 4 were Sustaining, and 3 were Life. The 35 cancellations break down as follows: 11 deceased, 17 by request, and 7 by reason of no response to statements for dues. At the close of the year membership stood at 957.

Archives

The organizing of our archives reminds one of a Chinese proverb: "Though the journey be 1000 miles long, the first step must nevertheless be taken." Our first step was taken three years ago, and now the journey's end is in sight. To date Miss Folkedahl has processed and written descriptions for 502 collections, ranging from a few pieces to 23,000 items.

The major project for 1963 was the processing of the O. E. Rølvaag Papers. The collection, filling seven filing cases and totaling 6,393 items, consists of notebooks, manuscripts, articles, book reviews, lectures, poems, clippings, scrapbooks, and articles by and about Rølvaag as author, teacher, and lecturer. More important is Rølvaag's extensive correspondence, which makes up three file cases. For example, the inventory shows 204 letters from Waldemar Ager, 239 from Birger Osland, 346 from D. G. Ristad, 324 from Lincoln Colcord, 226 from Kristian Prestgard, and 587 letters classified as "fan mail.'

The processing of this collection was made possible when Mrs. O. E. Rølvaag, Northfield, Minnesota, agreed to release most of her late husband's papers. Because of the preliminary work done by Mrs. Rølvaag, the task involved in organizing this collection was less than was first anticipated.

Unless new collections come in, it should be possible to begin the editing of the descriptions this coming summer, hopefully leading to their publication early in 1966.

Books

A total of 222 book orders were filled in 1963, and a total of 1,018 books were sold; sales amounted to \$2,525.19. This exceeds the earlier record set in 1961 by \$228.58. More than one-half (570 copies) of the books sold were *Studies and Records*. Volume 21 led the *Studies* sales with 55 copies. *The Lady with the Pen* led the other publications with 79

copies: Hjalmar Hjorth Boyesen was second with 54; Norwegian Migration to America: The American Transition, 30; Norwegian Migration, 1825-1860, 23; West of the Great Divide, 23. All others had a sale of 20 or less.

The book sales for the past six years are as follows: 1958, \$877.09; 1959, \$1,422.49; 1960, \$887.64; 1961, \$2,-296.61; 1962, \$1,869.75; 1963, \$2,525.19.

The following books are out of print: Frontier Mother, Norwegian Sailors on the Great Lakes, Laur. Larsen: Pioneer College President, Grass of the Earth, and Volume 7 of Studies and Records. DECORAH MUSEUM

Executive Committee Named

The Norwegian-American Historical Museum in downtown Decorah will have a new name. The Luther College board of regents recently voted to change the name to Norwegian-American Museum, "to more correctly identify the purpose for its existence and for the continuing importance that it may have to the culture it represents."

The regents also named an executive committee and are appointing "distinguished and devoted men and women interested in the preservation and development of Norwegian-American artifacts" to an official museum board. The first executive committee has been given the responsibility of recommending to the Luther president a person to be appointed as director of the museum. The entire museum board will formulate policies and handle general management of the museum.

The regents at a meeting in August authorized the establishment of the museum board and voted to select a site on the Luther campus for the construction of a new museum.

Executive committee members of the new museum board are Prof. Kenneth O. Bjork, editor of the Norwegian-American Historical Association; Prof. Clarence A. Clausen, St. Olaf College, Northfield; Dr. E. D. Farwell, president of Luther; Dr. Gunnar Gundersen, M.D., Gundersen Clinic in La Crosse, Wis., and past president of the American Medical Association; and Dr. V. T. Jordahl, director, service to Military Personnel of the American Lutheran Church, Minneapolis.

Other executive committee members are Mrs. Hubert T. Leseth of Decorah; Ira J. Melaas, Jr., Decorah attorney; Gerhard B. Naeseth, assistant director, general library of the University of Wisconsin; Professor Marion Nelson, University of Minnesota; and Mrs. Karl F. Rølvaag, wife of the governor of Minnesota.

The nationally known museum is recognized as the American museum best depicting the history of one ethnic group. Since its founding 87 years ago, the museum has steadily grown in importance. It now has a collection that spans the history of the Norwegian people in America. It has been featured in numerous newspaper and magazine articles, and is visited by hundreds of travelers during the summer months.

Because of the growing importance of the museum and the need to locate it closer to the college, the Luther regents on June 1, 1963, authorized and encouraged the college administration to seek funds to endow the museum and to erect a new building. The establishment of the board is the first step in that direction.

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
